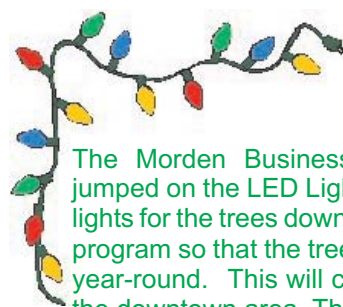


COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

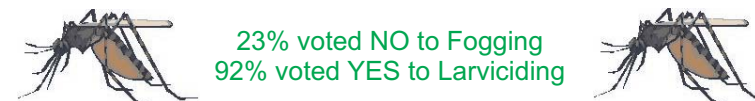
New Youth Member on Council

Mosquito Survey Results

In the last newsletter residents of Morden were invited to complete a questionnaire about mosquito spraying or larviciding for nuisance mosquitos. The response was not overwhelming. The data collected gave us the following statistics.



Council has received the full facts from the survey and have asked the Community Services Department for more information about the costs of a larviciding program for nuisance mosquitos. This would mean that larviciding would start in early May rather than waiting for government notice, which typically occurs near the end of June.

“Use Candles With Care, When You Go Out, Blow Out”



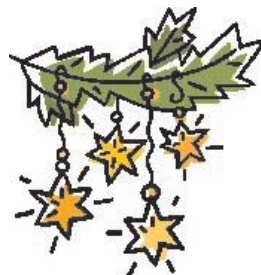

Keep combustibles clear of candles, provide a good holder and above all when you leave the room or building please remember to blow them out before leaving. Make sure that they are CSA approved holders for that particular candle. The unapproved Gel style candles have been documented to explode causing fire damage to rooms and buildings. By making your pledge you are simply stating that you will do your best to help protect the climate, reduce pollution and work towards meeting your one tonne goal. Simple as that!

C4 - HOLIDAY LIGHT EXCHANGE

Morden has just recently utilized Manitoba Hydro's Municipal LED Holiday Light Program. Our community exchanged 203 strings of incandescent lights for LED's (Light Emitting Diodes).

The aim of the exchange was based upon the efficiency of the lights. LED holiday lights are up to 97% more efficient than traditional lights which can provide an approximate savings of \$5 per string per month. Morden encourages and hopes more residents will take advantage of these new lights. The lights can be spotted on the holiday decorations suspended from the street light and on the trees downtown. For purchasing LED lights visit the local hardware stores.

OTC - COMBATING UNNECESSARY IDLING

As the chilly temperatures of Manitoba approach, vehicle idling seems to be an on going occurrence. Nothings better then jumping into a nice cozy vehicle that has been running for 20 to 30 minutes. But, on average, every Canadian idles for 10 minutes a day resulting in the waste of fuel, contributing to climate change and providing an unhealthy breathing environment for our youth. It may not seem a big deal, but if every driver in Morden idled for only 5 minutes per day, the community would be emitting approximately 1.34 tons of carbon dioxide every day or 487.98 tons per year. That's enough to fill 83 gymnasiums with CO2 per year. A person would waste roughly \$100 a year in fuel by idling for just 10 minutes a day.



Idle Free Community Partners

Several local businesses and organizations have committed to promoting idle free zones. These partners include; Morden Friendship Centre, Boundary Trails Health Centre, The Co-op Food Stores, Winkler Day Care and the Morden Child Care Centre. If you're a business who would like to promote an idle free zone and create community awareness, contact David Thurgar for further information.

Five Simple Steps to Reduce Idling

1. **Reduce Warm-up Idling** - In most driving conditions, start driving after no more than 30 seconds of idling, assuming your vehicle's windows are clear. Excessive idling is not good for your engine.
2. **Turn It Off After 10 Seconds** - Turn off your engine if you are going to be stopped for more than 10 seconds, except in traffic.
3. **Minimize Use Of Remote Car Starters** - These devices encourage you to start your vehicle before you are ready to leave, which means wasteful idling.
4. **Use A Block Heater** - In temperatures below 0 Celsius, use this device to warm up the engine before starting your vehicle. This will improve fuel efficiency and reduce exhaust emissions.
5. **Spread The Word** - Talk to your family, friends and neighbours about the benefits of reduced idling. Encourage them to join you in taking the One-Tonne Challenge and reducing greenhouse gas emissions as well as saving money, protecting the environment and contributing to a healthier community.

PROGRESS REPORTS

- Lighting has now been installed between 13th Street and the pedestrian bridge in Morden Park. As well, lights have been installed along the Bühler Boardwalk at Colert Beach.

- Upgrading of the public washroom in the Pembina Hills Arts Centre is also underway. When completed, this washroom will be wheelchair accessible.

PROGRESS REPORT

- Paving work has been completed for the year. We were able to finish this due to the good fall weather.
- Remote water meter retrofits are continuing. This program works quite well, the public's co-operation has been and is much appreciated.
- Sewer main re-lining has not been done this fall due to the unavailability of the contractor. We will be consolidating 2005 & 2006 re-lining work in March of 2006.
- A lagoon odor control program was implemented in September, which is intended to eliminate the odor problem.

SNOW REMOVAL

- The winter season has started and we have had 2 major snow falls this year.

REMINDER:

The Town of Morden DOES have a by-law addressing snow being pushed back onto streets. This can and does cause problems for vehicular traffic, as well as extra cost to the taxpayer when the department has to go back and remove these piles. The department will be monitoring this more closely this winter. Clean up costs may be charged to residents when required !!

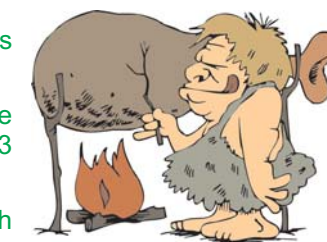
FOSSIL NEWS

Our curator, Anita Janzic, has done research at the University of Winnipeg using high tech facilities to identify the stomach contents of 'Betsy'.

- **JUNE 2006** will see the first public tours to our new field station and fossil dig site up at the Manitoba Escarpment. There will be a BBQ and VIP guests.



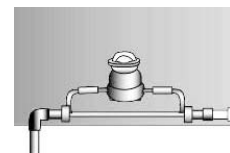

REMOTE READ WATER METERS

The Town of Morden is currently upgrading existing manual read water meters with Pro Read Meters that have a remote. This process is initially starting in the areas of Town with the older meters. Leaking and noisy meters are also being replaced with Pro Read Meters with a remote. People who have trouble accessing their meter may also be considered. These can be reported to the Town Office to make arrangements for replacement. Town staff & students read the water meters in February and August, the June and December billings are estimated. Pro Read Meters with Remotes follow the same schedule. Meter Readings can be phoned into the Town Office at 822-4434, emailed to rderksen@mordenmb.com, faxed to 822-6494, or submitted through the Town's website by the 20th of May and November to have a billing based on a reading instead of estimated. This also applies to February & August if the Meter Reader is unable to access the home. This process has been initiated as part of the Town's commitment to providing better utility user convenience.

Morden Police Service News

NO U-TURNS



Morden Police Service would like to remind motorists that there are no u-turns permitted on 5th street by Morden Collegiate. Signs are posted at both the south and north ends of the 300 block of 5th street prohibiting u-turns. The amount of traffic in this area, both vehicular and pedestrian during the school hours, presents a danger if vehicles are making u-turns. We are finding that parents drop their kids off at school and instead of proceeding down the street, they decide to make a u-turn. As mentioned in our last newsletter, we ask that motorists allow extra time to get to and from their destination and be extra cautious in the school zones. The fine for making a prohibited u-turn is \$105.00 under the Highway Traffic Act and 2 demerit points on your licence.

STREET LIGHTING PROBLEMS

Street lighting within a community plays an important safety role. The increase and improvements in street lighting made to our community has certainly enhanced many areas making it easier to see and safer to walk, bike or travel. There are times that streetlights need repair and the sooner this is reported, the sooner it can be fixed. Everyone can do their part in ensuring that streetlights are working properly by reporting the problem immediately. Manitoba Hydro maintains the street lights within our community and problems can be reported by logging onto the Town of Morden website at www.mordenmb.com, then going to the Public Works section where there is a link to lighting problems and Manitoba Hydro. PARKING BAN

A reminder that the Town of Morden parking ban is in effect prohibiting vehicles from parking on the street between the hours of 12 midnight to 8:00am. The By-Law, #12-2002, is in effect to facilitate snow clearing. Any vehicles parked on the roadway when snow clearing is necessary are subject to a fine of \$20.00 and/or being towed.
