Morden Business Improvement Area

The volunteer Board of Directors of the Morden Business Improvement Area (MBIA) is moving ahead with their plans for reorganization.

The MBIA is responsible for the beautification of the commercial areas in town, as well as promoting the area to visitors and residents.

The Board decided that it is time to welcome some different business people to the Board to assist with some of the special initiatives the MBIA is trying to get off the ground. Acting as Interim Chair of the Board is Mary Anne Groening, co-owner of Floral Scents. Acting as Interim Treasurer is Basil Holewka, owner of Photography by Basil. Other current Board members are Dr. Garry Malenchak, owner of Grass Roots Chiropractic, Ana-Maria Dawshka owner of Dimensions, and Councilor Maurice Butler.

Morden's Krazy Daze, which was held in June, was the last MBIA - sponsored promotional event for the year. The Board now wants to take the time to examine the marketing plan that was written for the area, and decide what projects it would like to proceed with.

In order to proceed, the Board is looking for business people in the business improvement area to participate in the organization. "Traditionally, the Board has met once a month, but with the re-organization, we would only meet 4 times a year to decide on future projects and to evaluate projects that were completed that quarter", explained Acting Chair, Mary Anne Groening. Some of the projects that the MBIA wants to look at are participation in the 125 Celebrations, special year-round lighting & decoration, and the execution of the marketing plan.

Mayor's Desk

When this Council was elected one of the greatest challenges facing the Town was to enhance the planning needed for economic development. This created a very unhappy atmosphere among our citizens. Council recognized this and set about correcting the situation. With a unity not seen for several Council terms and realizing that economic planning has a 30-40 year time frame Council set aside short term gain and decided to lay the groundwork for the future. The usual time lines have been compressed and although there is much to be done Morden is poised to see a period of unprecedented growth. The industrial park is now being prepared and available for use on an immediate basis before clients require property. We have laid the groundwork for retail property on the east side of Town where the lots are large enough to accommodate the larger parking lots required for larger stores.

These developments have all been planned with a payback of capital to the Town so that the taxpayer will benefit from having the service benefits without increased house taxes and from added taxes these developments bring. This balancing of residential assessment to retail and industrial assessment is crucial to the long-term tax well-being of the residential community. I would be remiss in not mentioning our housing. Once we finally received permission to annex surrounding land from the municipality our numbers have been unprecedented for the Town of Morden. In 2005 we added 113 housing units with an anticipated 100-120 for 2006 and forecasts showing approximately the same for 2007. With the additional population it is not a matter of if but when our commercial entrepreneurs pull the trigger on new developments.

Our Business Improvement District is progressing well. They partnered with the Town in the redevelopment of lighting and sidewalks on Stephen Street and are now poised to use their future money for Town enhancement (including all commercial areas). Council congratulates them. We look forward to these future projects.

The roles of Mayor and Councillors are often misunderstood. It is the duty of the Mayor, to suggest an agenda using the Town strategic business plan. He then chairs the discussion on topics and issues. The Council makes the decision. The Mayor presents the decisions of Council to the public and signifies by a positive vote his support of the decision of Council. The Mayor has only one vote. Even when in disagreement and voting against the motion it is the Mayor's responsibility to positively represent Council decisions and lead a united front. This is important! It gets the most things done. In my life on boards I have never seen a group so committed or unified as in this case, to the growth and lifestyle of our Town.

Life changes continuously. As I look forward to my retirement from active business in December I then look forward to having even more additional time to spend in the service of my community.

I cannot finish without mentioning Corn and Apple Festival. What a great job our committee did! Kudos to all involved.

This is the Face of Morden.

Public Works Department

PROGRESS REPORT

Sewer Mains

- The sewer main program is complete. Approximately \$300,000.00 was spent on renewals including , S. Railway St, Birchwood Dr. and Wardrop St. from 5th St. to 8th St.
- A total of 4,500 feet of sewer main was rehabilitated.

Note: The S. Railway portion was open cut, the paving will likely be done next spring.

Sidewalks - Bridges

- The sidewalk program for 2006 is complete. This included 12th St., 11th St. 100 blocks and the section on 6th St. 200 block for a total of 2,400 linear ft. of new sidewalk.
- The 100 blocks also required removal of the east side. On residential streets that are not considered business areas or school streets, the protocol is removal of one side (as required) and replacement of one side. This has been the practice for approximately 15 yrs.
- The Gilmour St. pedestrian bridge has been installed, complete with concrete ramps.
- The Parkhill Dr. bridge upsizing will be done in September. This will entail installing a large culvert and bank stabilization.



Paving Update

- Alexandria Dr. and Agar Crescent are now paved.
- Overlays are done on Route 100 and 5th St at an estimated 3,536 linear feet.
- Runway repairs were also done at the Morden Airport. This completes this year's program.
- Wilcocks Rd., Jefferson St. and the Boston Pizza access Rd. are currently being prepared for concrete. This



will be completed by late September. There is a total of approximately 6,560 linear feet of concrete road construction.

MESSAGE FROM THE DIRECTOR

We have had an excellent summer for construction work, with very little rain, there have been few setbacks. The development boom and everything that goes along with it, is keeping us very busy. We are hoping for a long fall so that projects can be completed for this year. We encourage residents to phone us directly if you have questions. Thank-you.

PROGRESS REPORT

- Lights are now installed that provide a lighted pathway from the West side of the footbridge in Morden Park to Gilmour Street.
- The new gate house at the entrance to Lake Minnewasta has been in operation for the majority of this season, and it has proven to have worked very well.
- Playground equipment has been ordered for a planned fall installation near the wading pool in Morden Park. This equipment includes a small climbing wall, a rock climber, a baby swing and a hanging spinner.
- A new steel post and chain barrier has been installed around the parking lot in the North section of Morden Park. This barrier replaces the old wood post and heavy cable system that was used for many years.
- Equipment has now been ordered for the Recreation Centre Concession. This concession is expected to be in operation at the beginning of October.



OTHER ITEMS OF INTEREST:

We are pleased to announce that Wes Van Damme and Scott Sutherland have been hired as full-time Recreation Facility Maintenance employees for the department.



A water fountain was installed at the entrance to Livingston Nature Park. In addition, several rock benches have been located throughout the park.

A number of community sporting groups are working cooperatively, with assistance being provided by Sport Manitoba, the Town of Morden, and Western School Division, in developing a local "Morden Community Sport & Leisure Alliance". It is hoped that this group will form an umbrella agency that will act as a resource for local sport and leisure groups in the development/delivery of their programs

FOSSIL NEWS

We are nearing the end of our very busy summer season. Our summer students have all done such a great job with public admissions considerably increased. The students (Corrine Penner; Kodley Bouachanthala; Evan Nordquist; Ryan Bataluk) all left us on August 31st to go on to their university and college courses; we wish them all well and look forward to seeing them again next year.

PROPOSED NEW MUSEUM BUILDING - Great news in this regard! We now have the support of the prestigious Thomas Sill Foundation, which has pledged \$30,000 toward the cost of the Feasibility Study for the new museum. In July we sent out Requests for Proposals to 10 architects & consultants all over Canada to submit their proposals to us for a Feasibility Study for a new museum building in Morden. The closing date for these submissions is September 29th 2006; then the sub committee, which is comprised of members of the board of directors and me, will decide which proposal is best. We then instruct the successful firm to carry out the Feasibility Study.

The Feasibility Study is an essential first step, as this will give us justification for building a new museum. I expect that the study will be completed in the spring of 2007; that is when we get really serious about our plans with major fundraising, marketing and public relations. We will be rallying the whole Town, public and business, local Municipal Councils, Provincial and Federal Governments plus foundations to get behind us, as there is no doubt that our new museum will be a *unique selling point* and a big draw for the Town and for the region.

PROJECT 'BETSY' - More good news! Our fossil crew has now found the rear part of the missing skull of Betsy plus some other fossils. The Betsy research project is still ongoing and we are very proud that our curator Anita Janzic has been accepted to present a 'poster' on the Betsy project at a major Paleontology Symposium in Ottawa in October 2006. This will put Morden on the map and gain international interest with both paleontologists and the curious public.

PROJECT 'COLLECTIONS' - The computerisation & digitisation of our collection records is almost complete and we give special thanks to Ryan Bataluk our summer student assigned to this project, he has worked diligently with this painstaking process. Just to reiterate, one of the main objectives is to ultimately upload the entire fossil collection details onto our website; this is a groundbreaking effort and will enable researchers world wide to see clearly what we have here and it will increase visitation. It will really put Morden on the world stage.

NEW 'BRUCE' GALLERY - The 'Bruce' gallery has been redesigned and renovated with brand new images, murals and excellent 'sound effects'. For those of you who have never been down here to see us, please make the trip, especially if you have kids, as all children love dinosaurs and our fossils are of sea creatures from about the same time as the dinosaurs. However, I should warn everyone **PREPARE for a SCARE**, we have had to turn the volume down on many occasions due to people being *very frightened* by our sound effects. So, come down if you dare! Though it is already open to the public, we will have the official unveiling of the new 'Bruce' Gallery on Monday, October 16th, with various dignitaries being invited to attend. There will also be a major press release.

CORN & APPLE FESTIVAL - We enjoyed record attendance this year with over 500 people visiting the museum and enjoying our facilities during Corn & Apple. For the first time we also had a booth downtown where the staff and volunteers directed the public towards the facility. This really worked well, good job guys!

NEW SIGNS - We hope that you can now see the long overdue signs that have been erected on the approaches to the museum, including signs actually at the Recreation Centre. This ties in well with the Manitoba Star Attraction signs, which are out on the highways far away, bringing in our visitors with clear directions.

THANK YOU - to all our board members and our great volunteers for a job very well done and very much appreciated.

Morden Police Service News

BACK TO SCHOOL TRAFFIC CHANGE

A reminder to motorists with school back in session for another year, there will be an increased amount of traffic including cyclists and pedestrians. Allow yourself some extra time to get to and from your destination. Be aware of the pedestrian crosswalks and corridors and generally allow for cyclists and pedestrians crossing at intersections. Extra caution should always be taken traveling in and around school zones. Be aware of school buses preparing to stop as well. Motorists are required to stop when the emergency lights on school buses are activated, both following and approaching school buses. Drivers are reminded that they are to stop no less than 5 metres from the school bus when it's lights are activated and remain stopped until the lights are shut off. One must wait until the emergency lights are deactivated before travel may be resumed. The fine for passing a school bus is \$535.00 plus demerit points.

SCHOOL CROSSING GUARDS

The crossing guards at our schools play an important role in the safety of the students coming to and leaving school. Each year, we get several complaints of drivers failing to comply with the crossing guards signals driving through the intersection while students are in the middle of crossing, failing to stop at stop signs, and generally traveling at speeds or in a manner that is unsafe. We ask that parents dropping their children off comply with the drop off zones and no parking areas in and around the schools. Be extra cautious in the school zones and help keep our community safe!

LOCKS FOR YOUR BIKES

We also ask parents/students to ensure they have locks for their bikes and lock them up at the schools. Each year, we receive several reports of bikes being taken from the schools.

Emergency Preparedness



With the recent tornado event in Gull Lake, citizens of Morden/Winkler/RM Stanley and Plum Coulee may be wondering what your Emergency Preparedness Committee (acronym: **SERC**) and Emergency Coordinator have been doing to prepare for a tornado emergency.

Over the last year...

- A severe weather contingency plan has been developed and distributed to all emergency services;
- Consultation with the Town of Altona has taken place to cost-share in the on-going expenses required for the positioning of a Weather Radio Transmitter in Altona;
- Testing a siren alarm system in Morden during the Manitoba Association of Fire Chiefs' recent annual meeting in Morden;
- Grant application for business and household Emergency Quick Reference Guides for Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness Canada funding... and
- On-going consultation with Manitoba Emergency Measures Organization's Regional Emergency Officer (Marc Bruyere)

If all of these projects were to be fully implemented, your Emergency Services Committee (SERC) would still require citizen and business co-operation in order to have an effective emergency alerting system. When the Weather Radio Transmitter is in operation, citizens would need to purchase Weather Radios and would need to be aware of what signal would be given by your community to warrant taking cover during a tornado or severe storm event.

Message from the By-law Officer



Bylaw 1-01 is to regulate **Nuisances and Derelict, Abandoned Property.**

Reminder, if you have an unregistered vehicle parked on your property it is to be stored in a manner that it is not visible to any part of the street or lane. This has caused some confusion in the past so please note that this is indeed the case. Also in regards to nuisances in weed control and grass cutting. As a property owner you are responsible to ensure that these are dealt with. You will receive a notice if upon a complaint, and an inspection it is deemed necessary to advise you of the required actions.
